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DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

February 2016

Bicycle Rodeo Program

The police department is in the process of organizing this year's Annual Bicycle Rodeo Event. The rodeo will be held on Saturday, April 16th, in conjunction with the Bike and Helmet fit day. The event will be held at the Philip Heit Center for Healthy New Albany. The day is scheduled to begin at 10:00 am with a bicycle inspection. Previously, the Bicycle Rodeo was held in June. The helmet fitting and the rodeo should complement each other and promises to be a great event for the community.

Hiring Process

The police department conducted physical fitness testing for the position of police officer. Those who passed the test were invited to screening interviews in March. The department anticipates having successful candidates attend the Ohio State Patrol Academy beginning in August, 2016. The city is also in the process of a hiring process for the positions of police clerk and 911 dispatchers.

Deer Management Program

The New Albany Deer Management Program ran from September 26, 2015 through February 7, 2016. Ninety hunters qualified and were eligible to participate in the program. Of those ninety, 62% of them participated in the program.

Thirty three deer were harvested this season, seventeen less than last season. Nine deer were donated to Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry (FHFH). There were many changes in the hunting zones this season. Four hunting zones that had been utilized in previous seasons were removed. Six new hunting zones were added, two zones in the Franklin county portion of the city and four in the Licking County portion of the city. Two of the zones that were lost yielded five to ten deer harvested in previous seasons.

The program also saw a high number of first time participants in the program, 39% of the hunters were first time participants. The buck kill rule was also changed this season. There was a two doe requirement before a buck could be harvested. This requirement was removed as of December 1st. The change was requested by hunters and the hope was the program would see more participation during the last three months of the season. The mild winter did have a positive effect on participation during the last three months of the but only three deer were harvested.

Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency Certification

The department has begun the process of gaining certification from the Ohio Collaborative Community Police Advisory Board. The board was established by Governor Kasich to oversee implementation of recommendations from the Ohio Task Force on Community-Police Relations. The board created new standards for law enforcement agencies in the State of Ohio. The standards cover use of force, use of deadly force, and employee recruitment and hiring. The department is currently reviewing and editing its current directives and policies for compliance.

COMMUNITY POLICING

Franklin County DUI Task Force

The department deployed an additional officer during the Super Bowl as part of the Task Force's Super Bowl Enforcement Blitz. The officer made eleven traffic stops, issued three speed citations, a seatbelt citation, five other citations and two warnings. The goal of this blitz and others like it is to reduce the number of alcohol related crashes in Franklin County .

New Albany Safety Town

Registration for camp opened March 1, 2016, and after only one day 274 families registered to join the Primary and Graduate camps. The Pilot Graduate Camp program is for children who have already attended Safety Town and who are entering first or second grade in the coming fall school year. This camp will hold four classes totaling 72 children over four days from 8:30 a.m.—12:30 p.m. The children will receive more detailed instruction on police and emergency safety, fire and home safety, water safety and pedestrian crossing safety to include our new roundabout crosswalks. The campers will take field trips to the New Albany Police Station, Plain Township Fire Department and the Gold Fish Swim School, where they will receive water safety instruction and enjoy free swim time. Registration for all camps will close April 29, 2016.

Compliment

The department received a card complimenting and thanking the officers who responded to a bomb threat received at the Jewish Community Center (JCC) on February 9th.

"Thank you for your excellent protection and responsiveness in making our facility safe during last week's bomb scare. We are proud of your service and pray for your safety and health always."

Sergeant Daniels, Detective Deckop, and officers Wall and Kelly responded to the JCC after the school received a bomb threat. The officers evacuated the building and then searched it with the assistance of K-9 units. Fortunately the threat was unfounded.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

February 2016

Projects and Programs:

On February 4th, Officer Southers met with a group of middle school teachers at the 2-8 building to discuss the Alert Lockdown Inform Counter Evacuate ("ALICE") procedures and how they relate to the unique layout of the 2-8 building. This group of teachers were not included in previous theoretical school safety drills held at the 2-8 building. The session was productive and as a result of this meeting a window lock that had been overlooked was removed from a 1st floor classroom allowing for easier evacuation if ever needed.

On February 18th, Officer Southers and Officer Kelly met with some of the recess aides at the K-1 building to discuss ALICE procedures in response to active shooter events and how these procedures pertain to their daily activities. The round table session was also recorded so it could later be viewed by those aides who were not in attendance.

Enforcement/Calls for Service:

Officer Southers was called to handle a variety of law enforcement matters throughout the month of February including a reverse lockdown due to a theft suspect fleeing, student well-being check, investigation into student with a gun which turned out to be unfounded and speed enforcement.
