DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

September 2016

Communications Center

Dispatcher Teasa Wollenburg and Heather Cole completed their emergency dispatching training on September 12th. The additional dispatchers will allow the department to increase staffing levels in the communication center during peak hours. The selection process for one additional dispatcher is nearly complete. If an applicant is selected, she will likely begin the training program in November.

Earlier in 2016, the city's 911 system was replaced. The new 911 system is performing as anticipated and is able to provide better statistical information. The communication center received 110 emergency 911 calls in September

Property Room

The Franklin County Prosecutor's Office returned the department's approved property destruction request. Property room officers destroyed 777 items impounded from 176 cases, as approved by the court. The items destroyed were approximately half of the items to be destroyed. The property contained in the destruction order include evidence from closed criminal and traffic cases and items like drugs and weapons that cannot be returned to their owners.

Active Threat Training

Over the past several months the police department has received numerous request for active threat training or better known as active shooter training. The department is working with the businesses to complete the training as requested. The department has several officers who are certified instructors. The purpose of the training is to provide business and their employee with best and safe practices that are intended to increase the survivability of work place shooting.

Block Watch

The North of Woods Block Watch group held their Block Watch picnic on September 14th. The picnic was held on Cavendish Court and well over fifty residents attended. Officer Ryan Southers served as the grill master serving burgers, brats and hot dogs.

The police department has hosted a citizen police academy annually. Because of staffing levels, no citizen police academy was held in 2016. The department plans to bring the citizen police academy back in 2017. Planning is underway and we anticipate many changes to the academies' curriculum and the students' experience.


Deer Management

New Albany's Deer Management season began in September. Approximately one hundred hunters are participating this year. The hunting season will conclude in February, 2017. The bow hunters are permitted to hunt in undeveloped areas of the city with the land owners' permission. The goal of the program is to manage the deer population within the city and to reduce the amount of deer vs car crashes.

2016 Walking Classic

On Sunday, September 6th the police department assisted with the 2016 Walking Classic. With an estimated 3200 participants officers provided traffic direction and security along the course.
