Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE) Graduation

On Friday, February 9, 2018 Sergeant Curtis Baker graduated from the Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE) program. Sergeant Baker was part of the 22nd class and has now completed all of the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police's leadership programs including STEP, PELC, and CLEE. The class of 29 law enforcement professionals demonstrated a high level of professional competence and a mastery of the CLEE's leading knowledge priorities. Congratulations to Sergeant Baker.



Leadership of New Albany Tour

On February 15, 2018 Chief Jones gave a tour for the Leadership New Albany Class of 2018. The class was offered by the New Albany Chamber of Commerce for existing and emerging leaders and intended to expose the participants to the New Albany community. During the tour the class received demonstrations of the distracted driving simulator and Naloxone, the opioid overdose reversal medication.

Assistance to Westerville

On February 11th officers represented our agency at the funerals of Westerville Police Officer's Anthony Morelli and Eric Joering. Both officers were fatally shot while responding to a domestic violence incident.

On February 18th Dispatcher Allen assisted the Westerville Division of Police's Communication Center in providing mutual aid coverage. Dispatchers from around the area worked in Westerville's Communications Center in the days following the death of the two officers. The support from other jurisdictions allowed their dispatchers to take time off while they coped with the tragedy.

Text to 9-1-1 Upgrade

On February 5th Chief Jones and Dispatch Supervisor Lybarger attended the PSAP Managers meeting to discuss the MECC's completion of the 9-1-1 upgrade. The department has completed most of the preparations needed for the text to 9-1-1 implementation and will begin testing in the near future. The implementation date will be determined by the county 9-1-1 board and it will be implemented county-wide on the same date.

Chilly Chili Mile

On February 11, 2018 officers assisted with the Chilly Chili Mile. Several hundred individuals participated in the one mile walk that went through the Market Square area.

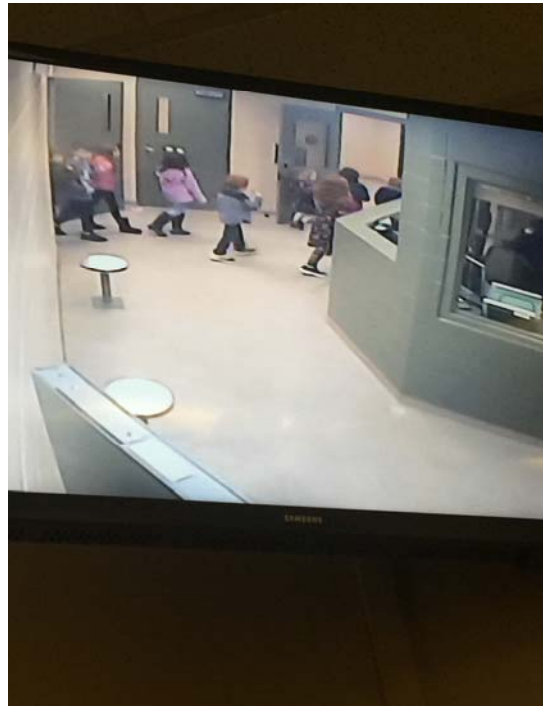
Valentines at the PD

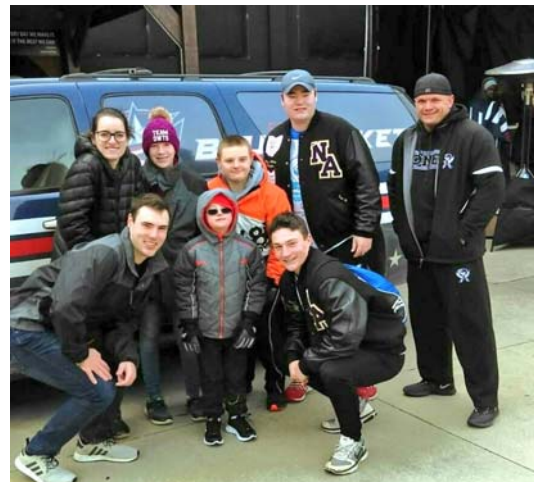
2017-2018 Deer Management Program

The New Albany Deer Management program ran from September 30, 2017 through February 4, 2018. Of the 101 hunters who were eligible for the program, 53 of them were active during the program season. Twenty-six deer were harvested during this year’s program, down from last year. Twenty-three of those were does and three were bucks and two were donated this year. The deer management program helps to thin the deer population within the city and reduce the chances for car v. deer accidents.

2018 Polar Plunge

Officer Kelly took part in the 2018 Columbus Polar Plunge for the Special Olympics presented by the Basement Doctor. Officer Kelly jumped in with the New Albany Special Olympics team, which was made up of special Olympic athletes as well as New Albany High School students and family members. The event was held at Express Live, in Downton Columbus, on February 3rd. The volunteers had to remove several inches of ice from the surface of the pool that morning, then added wheel barrels full of bagged ice just to make sure the water was just right. Officer Kelly received a letter from a student. The letter states:

“Dear Officer Kelly, Today I wore Blue to support the Officers who have passed away this weekend. Everyone counts on you to help us and protect us. In 5th Grade I had you as my D.A.R.E teacher, you helped us learn all the basics about protecting us and protecting each other. I loved how at the end you brought in those goggles, which were drunk goggles that we put on to see what it would look like if we were drunk. It was so fun! I wish we could do it again, and I wish I could see you more often. Every Officer needs to protect them self, even if there job is to help rescue or catch guilty people. Who did terrible things/crimes. I hope you keep yourself safe, and just remember everyone cares and Loves you. You helped us, now it’s time to do our deed. Thank you for protecting us, and those two officers (Westerville) are in a better place now.”
