DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS April 2019

Tree City USA Awards Event

This year, the City of Bexley, Ohio, and Capital University hosted the 2019 Tree City, Tree Line and Tree Campus USA Awards Event. The director, operations manager and several maintenance workers attended. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation and provides national recognition for communities with Urban Forestry programs throughout the country. The Tree Campus USA program helps colleges and universities around the country establish and sustain a healthy community forest. The Tree Line USA program recognizes best practices in utility arboriculture. The day's program started off with remarks from Susan Quintenz, chair of the City Tree and Public Garden Commission and Christine Anderson, Ph.D. from the Primmer Outdoor Learning Center. Afterwards attendees toured Bexley Sustainable City Hall, Bexley Mill and Capital University Sustainable Habitat. The event concluded with an awards presentation and remarks from Tyler Stevenson, Urban Forestry program manger.

City Forester Interviews

The advertising and evaluation process for the vacant position of City Forester has resulted in two strong candidates for consideration. The final phase of interviewing consisted of a meeting with the city manager and answering questions. For the finalist, the process will conclude with a check of the applicants references. It is hopeful that the new City Forester will begin employment at the end of May.

The service department is preparing for updates to the departments Workplace Policies and provide training to maintenance staff to continue to stay in compliance with PEERP (Public Employment Risk Reduction Program) standards. PROJECT PLANNING UPDATES April 2019

New Albany Arbor Day Event

The city hosted its annual Arbor Day event at Safety Town this year. "Other holidays repose upon the past; Arbor Day proposes for the future." These are J. Sterling Morton's stirring words about the holiday he initiated in 1872. In honor of Arbor Day, two eight-foot Redbud trees and five pint-sized Paw Paw trees were planted around New Albany Safety Town grounds to further strengthen the community's urban forest program. Despite overcast skies and light rain, a group of New Albany High School students graciously assisted in the tree planting ceremony. Public service department staff and City Council member Kasey Kist attended and also assisted in the planting. Aaron Noblet from Preservation Arborists, LLC, was also on site to direct the planting celebration. These plantings strengthen New Albany's natural landscape and illustrate the community's commitment to beautiful surroundings for generations to come.

Earlier in the week, Maintenance Workers Kenny Geiger, Andrew Love and Chad Smith performed spring cleanup at Safety Town so the site was ready for the Arbor Day Event. Aaron Noblet from Preservation Arborists, LLC explained the benefits that trees provide, information about the specific tree species being planted (aesthetics, historical uses etc.) and explained guidelines for proper tree planting. Before the event concluded, a group photo was taken with the student participants.



2018 City Sidewalk Improvement Project

- Decker Construction was the low bid contractor for performing sidewalk replacement as part of the city street improvement project at a cost of \$263,226.
- Upper Fenway and North of Woods were targeted for the improvement work.
- Sidewalk improvements began in July and were completed in September.

2018 City Street Improvement Project

- The low bidder was Decker Construction at a base bid price of \$911,909.
- Work includes ADA curb ramp improvements, pavement overlay, curb repair and crack sealing.
- Construction schedule was July 1, 2018 to September 30, 2018.

Spring Roadside Cleanup Project

The service department's annual Spring Roadside Cleanup Project was cancelled due to continuous rain. However, maintenance staff completed the trash collection within their daily work schedule. SR 161 roadsides were cleaned and a total of 91 bags of trash equaling 3185 pounds of waste were collected. The cleanup event is scheduled annually before the mowing season begins.

Bevelhymer Park Sewer Service

AEP contractors were digging a new pole foundation at Bevelhymer Park when they damaged the sanitary service line for the Parks Office. To assist the repairing contractor, Maintenance Workers Carl McNeal and Chase Loughman used the city's jet/vac truck to clean compacted debris from the existing line. AEP is providing reimbursement to the Parks District and city for the repairs and cleaning performed.

No Parking Signs Installed on Keswick Drive

Service crews installed No Parking Signs on Keswick Drive from US 62 to Ogden Woods at the request of residents living on the street. Tenants living in the new Main Street apartments have been parking on Keswick Drive and blocking the mailboxes and limiting access for emergency vehicles.

Street Sign Replacement Project

Maintenance Worker Tyler Myers is compiling an inventory of all street name signs throughout the city. Tyler's work is part of a multi-year project in which the service department is updating street signs to the new retro-reflectivity standards set by the Federal Highway Administration. The new signs will have black letters on a white reflective background.
