DEPARTMENT STRUCTURE

Administration:

The front office is staffed by three employees each weekday between the hours of 7:30 am and 4:30 pm. This staff consists of the following positions:

Director Public Service Manager Administrative Assistant

The front office staff supports the administrative and operational needs of every division within the public service department.

Maintenance Division:

The maintenance division is staffed by 26 employees responsible for owning and maintaining all of the city's public infrastructure and facilities. This includes maintaining all city-owned roadways, street lights, traffic signals, fire hydrants, storm sewers, sanitary sewers and waterlines. This team is also responsible for utility marking, roadside mowing, leaf collection and snow and ice removal. In addition, this group maintains all city-owned buildings and facilities including Rose Run Park, Village Hall, the Police Department, the Public Service Department, the Phelps House, the Guzzo building, three water booster stations and a water tower.

Fleet Maintenance Division:

The fleet division is staffed by three employees responsible for servicing and maintaining a fleet of more than 100 vehicles along with a wide variety of equipment valued at +/- 11 million dollars. This team oversees the fuel management system for all departments, performs preventative maintenance and equipment repair and manages the acquisition and decommissioning of fleet vehicles. The fleet maintenance division also manages the New Albany Smart Ride Program.


Forestry Division:

Utilities Division

Sanitary Sewer Inspection

The utilities division set up a sanitary line inspection for the recently installed Worthington Road subtrunk Extension Phase I and Phase II. The utilities team is taking a proactive approach with newly installed in-frastructure. The utilities team inspected all manholes for obstructions, infiltration, and if top of casting is at final grade. The team also inspected the mainline thoroughly with the sewer camera and sewer inspection software. The data was logged related to these inspections and any defects are shared with the contractor to correct.

This proactive work ensures that when the City takes ownership of the infrastructure, the infrastructure is issue free and ready for use. Since implementing these inspections, the utilities team has identified problems and prevented multiple sanitary backups for future business owners and the City of New Albany. The utilities team inspected a total distance of 16,616'.

The right of way crew has been working on many different projects throughout the city. The US62/Morse Road roundabout project was completed by McCullough's Landscape.



Forestry Division

Holkham Underdrain Root Pruning

The forestry team worked alongside the utilities and right of way crews to expose and prune roots that were in the way of a new underdrain installation. Many of the trees on Holkham are large and would not have survived having an excavator tear out their roots.

Pruning

Contract pruning this year has completed trees on Byington Ln, Farley Ct, Decker Dr, and Goodheart Ct while Pembrooke Pass and Willow Grove are underway. The next streets to be pruned are Sutton Pl, Leverett Pk, and Ogden Woods.

Aspinwall is currently being pruned in-house. In-house pruning in October will shift to oak trees as they can only be pruned in the dormant season, but spot pruning of other trees will continue as needed.

Emergency Removal

The forestry team removed a large sycamore street tree after a tree root and infrastructure conflict led to many of the primary supportive roots being severed. Upon inspection it was clear that the tree had previously lost structural roots due to past infrastructure conflict and up to 70% of the root zone had been impacted. The size and location of the tree made this a dangerous situation and so the tree was removed immediately.


Fleet showcase






Right of Way Permits

Right of Way permits are facilitated and issued by the City of New Albany for utilities planned to be installed within the public right of way.




Special Hauling Permits

Special hauling permits are facilitated and issued for the operation of vehicles exceeding the maximum roadway weight, width, height and/or length and are considered 'oversized'.




OUPS

The right of way division provides utility marking service for all city-owned utilities located within the public right of way and city-owned property.






The public service department participates and assists with many special events and projects throughout the year often requiring significant labor hours from our team.







General Maintenance
