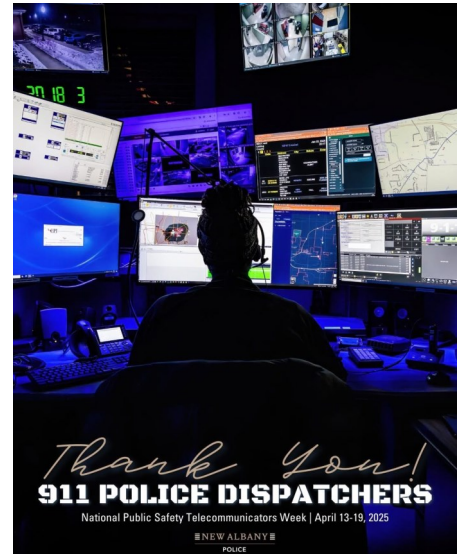

Telecommunications Week

New Department Staff

Gabrielle Kamps was hired as a police officer and began the Columbus Police Department's Basic Training Academy this month. The academy is approximately six months long and upon graduation, she will complete a four month field training program where she will be partnered with training officers for additional on the job training.

Drug Take Back

On April 26th Officers C. Peters and L. Kelly participated in the Drug Enforcement Agency's (DEA) Drug Take Back Initiative in partnership with Plain Township Fire Department. This offers the opportunity for citizens to turn in unwanted medications for destruction. The officers operated a site at the Plain Township Fire Department and collected 83.8 pounds of unwanted medication that may have been abused by others or disposed of in harmful ways such as in the City's water supply.

K9 Amigo Deployment Summary

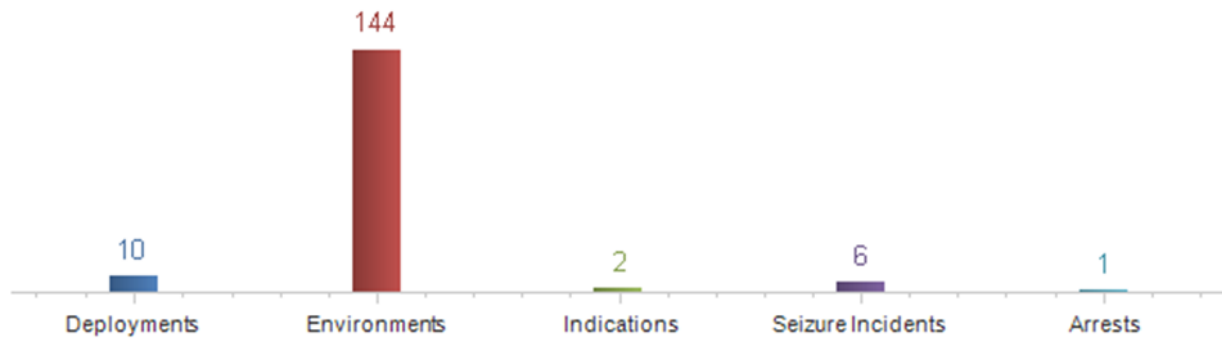
During the month of April, Amigo and his handler conducted ten deployments with two indications, resulting in the seizure of six items and one arrest.

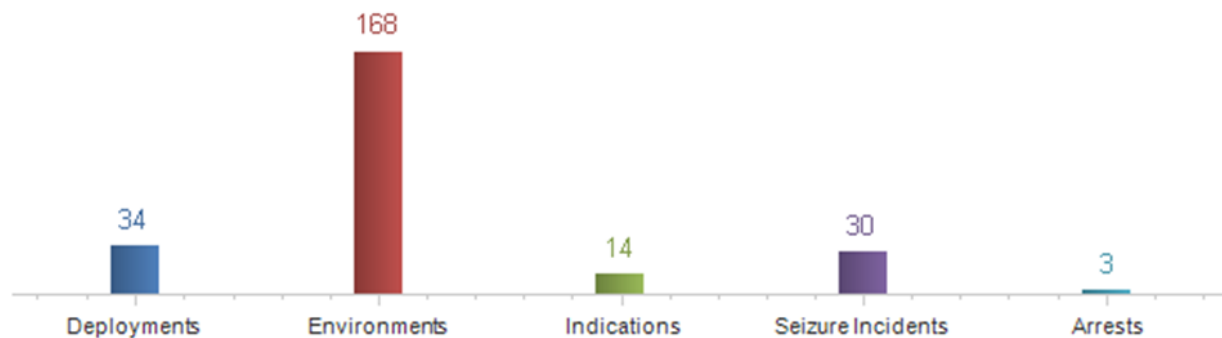

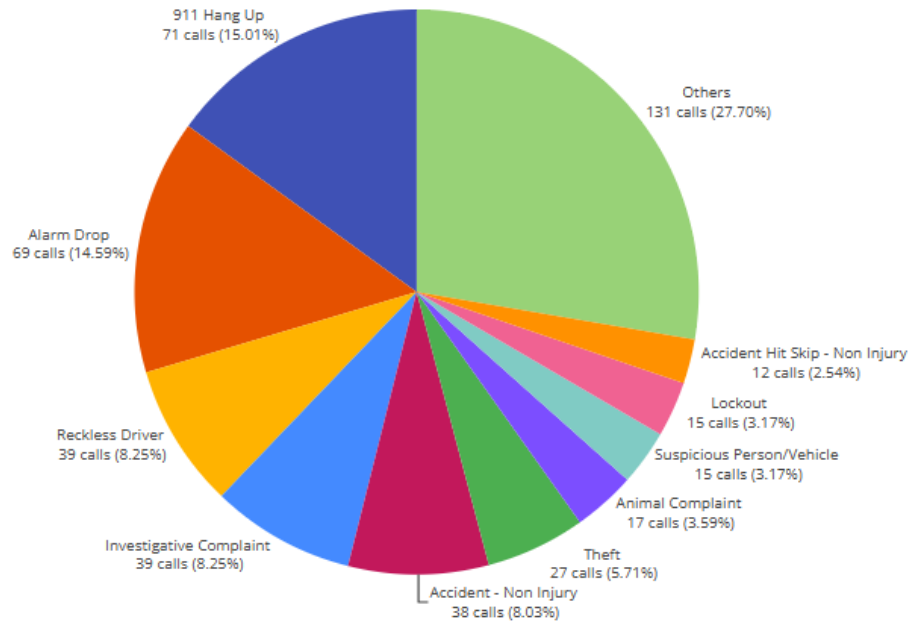

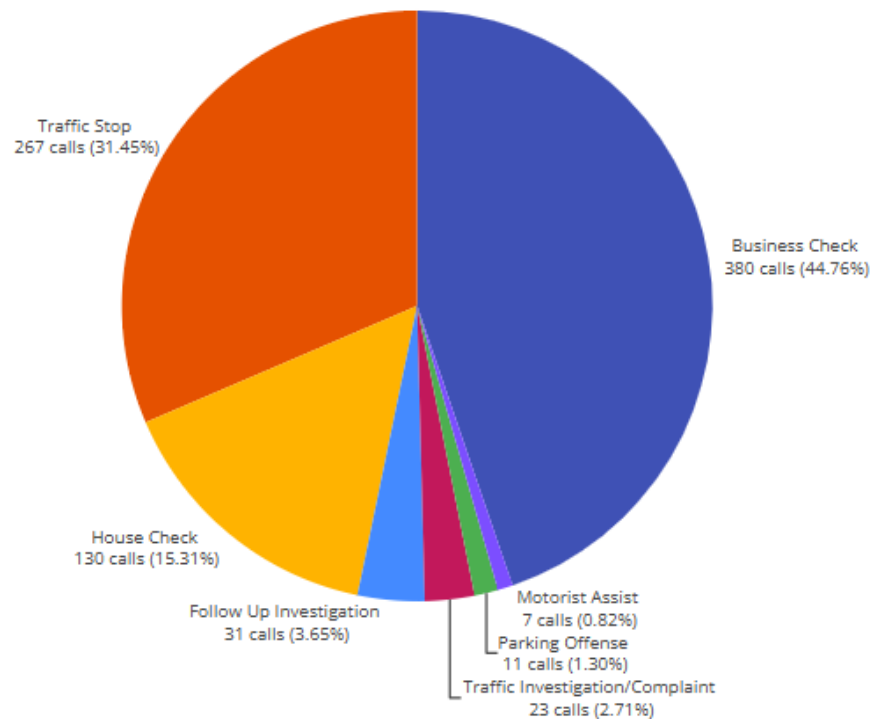

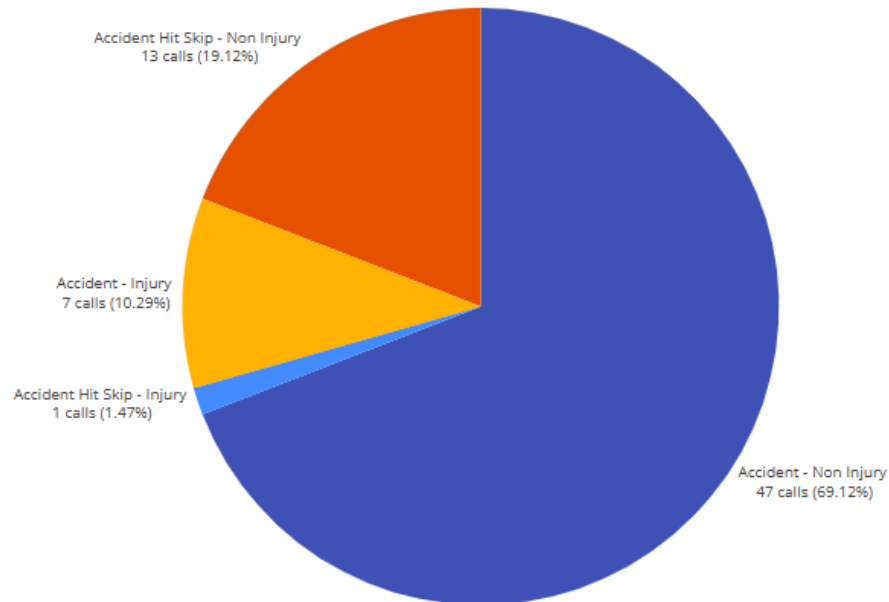

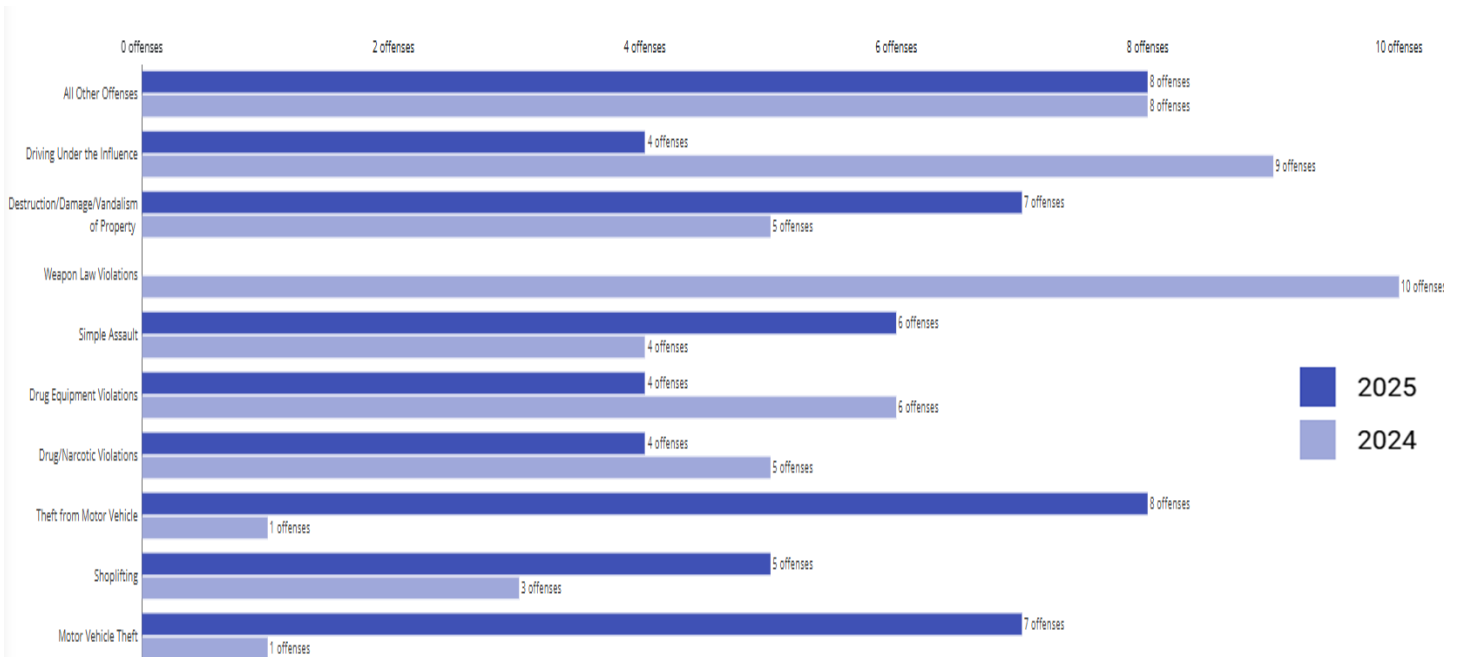
OFFICER INITIATED—849



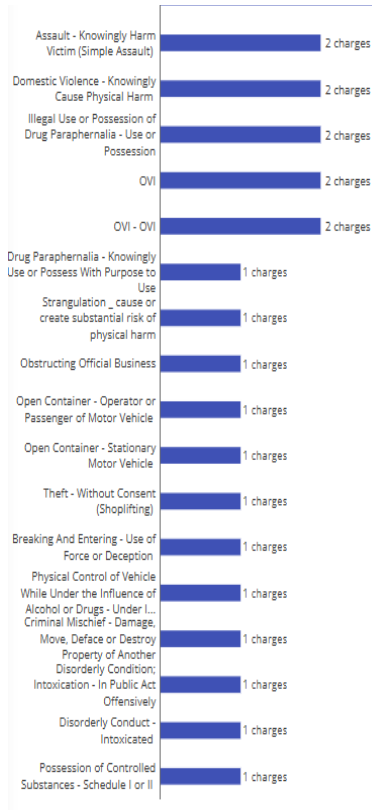
ACCIDENT BY TYPE
