Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Chair Mary Fee at 3:36 p.m.

Approval of Meeting Minutes:

Clerk Mason reported she was able to restore the board's redlined changes to the Historical Marker Application Statement of Significance after distribution of the proposed minutes. She swapped in the April 28 redlined statement and pulled out the April 30 version to attach to the original April 28 minutes. Chair Fee moved to approve the April 28, 2026 meeting minutes as corrected. Vice Chair Stoughton seconded. All members voted to approve the April 28, 2026, meeting minutes as corrected.

Approval of the Agenda:

Chair Fee moved to approve the agenda. Vice Chair Stoughton seconded. All members voted to approve the May 26, 2026, agenda.

Hearing of Visitors:

Clerk Mason reported that Keri O'Donnell had asked her to share with the board that she had successfully located records to prove service in the Revolutionary War for Jesse Byington and Ezekiel Goodrich. Ms. O'Donnell was hunting for the service records for James H. Ginn.

Other Business:

New Albany Cemetery Historical Marker – Post Submission Updates

Clerk Mason and Chair Fee reviewed the handful of changes made to the historical marker text and Statement of Significance after the board approved those items but before they were submitted to the Ohio History Connection. They described the process of backing up all assertions, including the challenge of finding a modern-day listing and map with New Albany road names.

New Albany Cemetery/Rose Run 2 Project – Design Options

Deputy City Manager Joly presented the attached slides. She reported that, in addition to the 2 gravestone pieces found back in April, potential new grave shafts were discovered on the northwest and southeast sides of the New Albany Cemetery. As a result, the planned memorial wall would probably be pulled back a few feet, per Ohio State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) requirements, so as not to cross into the grave sites. Archaeologist David Lamp had identified two new graves capped with rubble and a third that was not capped.

The workers would be monitoring those areas going out an additional 15 feet. The site at the southwest corner was correctly spaced for a burial, but the orientation appeared to be reversed, as sometimes happened with clergy burials. There was also a possible grave shaft on the north edge but that dirt disturbance could have come from a buried sewer line. Deputy City Manager Joly stated there was more to come as the city and project coordinators worked with SHPO.

Member Gastineau asked and Deputy City Manager Joly confirmed that the workers did locate the cemetery vault foundation.

Deputy City Manager Joly reviewed the proposed design features around the New Albany Cemetery, including the posts marking the corners, landscaping, plaques, entry points, historical marker location, and educational signage. The green areas on the PowerPoint slide would have harder landscaping to reinforce the entry points. This could include or not include a mown path. Either way, it would not be a wide-open field. Deputy City Manager Joly described entry arch options with and without the lettering and cemetery demarcation with soft mown edges or flush concrete/stone edges.

Member Gastineau asked and Deputy City Manager Joly stated the city would better know the cost of the project in a few weeks when estimates and bidding were complete.

Chair Fee preferred the first arch option which she believed was more common for cemeteries. Some board members agreed that the second option looked more like one would find in a modern subdivision or a zoo. Member Gastineau liked the retaining wall. Member Foreman liked the fourth arch, finding it peaceful. Member Gastineau asked and Deputy City Manager Joly answered that, if not placed on the arch, the cemetery name would be on the plaques. Member Forman asked and Deputy City Manager Joly replied there was upkeep attached all aspects of the Rose Run 2/Veteran's Memorial project, so the upkeep for a particular type of arch was not a concern. The bollard in the depicted arch designs was there for scale, not as an example of placement.

Deputy City Manager Joly described ways to mark the historic cemetery boundary using soft mowing or inset stone. The inset stone would be used to show the vault foundation. Chair Fee liked the soft mown edge and noted that the city could come back and introduce the stone inset later, if needed. Board members and Deputy City Manager Joly discussed the retaining wall lines and how the top would stay level as the grade dropped. The curved retaining wall protected the gravestones. The drawings showed an entry arch on the south side. The board further discussed the mowed paths and landscaped areas. The inset stones might create a path. Member Forman liked the soft lines and thought that was more in line with a historic cemetery versus the concrete.

Chair Fee thanked Deputy City Manager Joly for working on solutions to the board's concerns. Deputy City Manager Joly stated this was an important project and projects worked better with community input.

Member Foreman suggested involving the New Albany Plain Local Schools and school kids with cemetery education projects. There were things that the primary school, history students, and local scouts could contribute. Her daughter would be interested and would want people to pay attention to who was buried here. She asked and Chair Fee confirmed there hadn't been much talk of programming yet, but, even in 2018, the CRAB was talking about QR codes with links to more information on the city's website.

The board discussed the official name of the "New Albany Cemetery" versus older references to the "Old Burying Grounds" and very recent references to "Founders Field." The board agreed to maintain New Albany Cemetery as the designation, which was also notably on the Historical Marker application.

New Albany Cemetery – Headstones to be Recreated

Clerk Mason shared the attached documents in her files that pointed to gravestones that were too damaged to be repaired or documented as missing. She also distributed the 2 quotes the city received for gravestone recreation.

Board members agreed that there was enough documentation, particularly the addendum supplied by Nancy Ferguson, to support creating a stone for New Albany founder William Yantis (d. June 2, 1872). William Henry Yantis, William Yantis' son, had a photographed grave stone at the former Africa Road cemetery, so the board did not support a stone for him in the New Albany Cemetery. The board discussed and supported stones for William H. Yantis (d. January 4, 1854) - the grandson of William Henry Yantis, Amanda M. Yantis, James Conkle, and Lorenzo Ulry. The board further supported creating a headstone for Reverend Joshua Montgomery, for whom there was a footstone found but no headstone, and for his wife Susannah Tanner Montgomery. The board discussed documentation around Mary Ann "Molly" Olinger Kohn and Sarah Sager Kohn.

Member Gastineau asked where the new stones would go. The board and staff discussed how most of the gravestones were not directly over identified gravesites per the attached map unless the site was known to be that person. There were only a few headstones believed to be in the correct position. Otherwise, the stones were purposefully not over gravesites so as not act as pointer to a specific person. Member Foreman wondered whether Rev. Joshua Montgomery's stone should face the opposite direction since he was clergy.

The board and staff discussed the location of the remaining gravestone pieces, which were still in a garage for storage, and what should happen to them. Some board members suggested they could be placed around the vault, generally placed in the cemetery grounds, or be incorporated into a stone.

Board members agreed to wait until the next CRAB meeting when more members were present to vote on the design options presented by Deputy City Manager Joly and the gravestones to be recreated. Manager Hobart recommended to Clerk Mason to request a mid-year appropriation adjustment to budget for gravestone recreation.

Schedule next meeting:

The board agreed to hold their regular meeting on June 23, 2026 at 3:30 p.m. Member Jacobs stated she would likely not be able to attend.

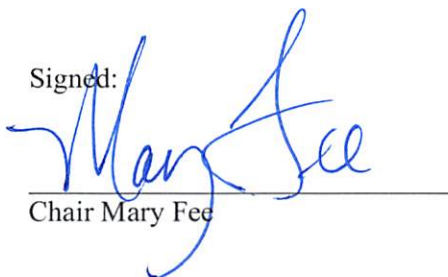

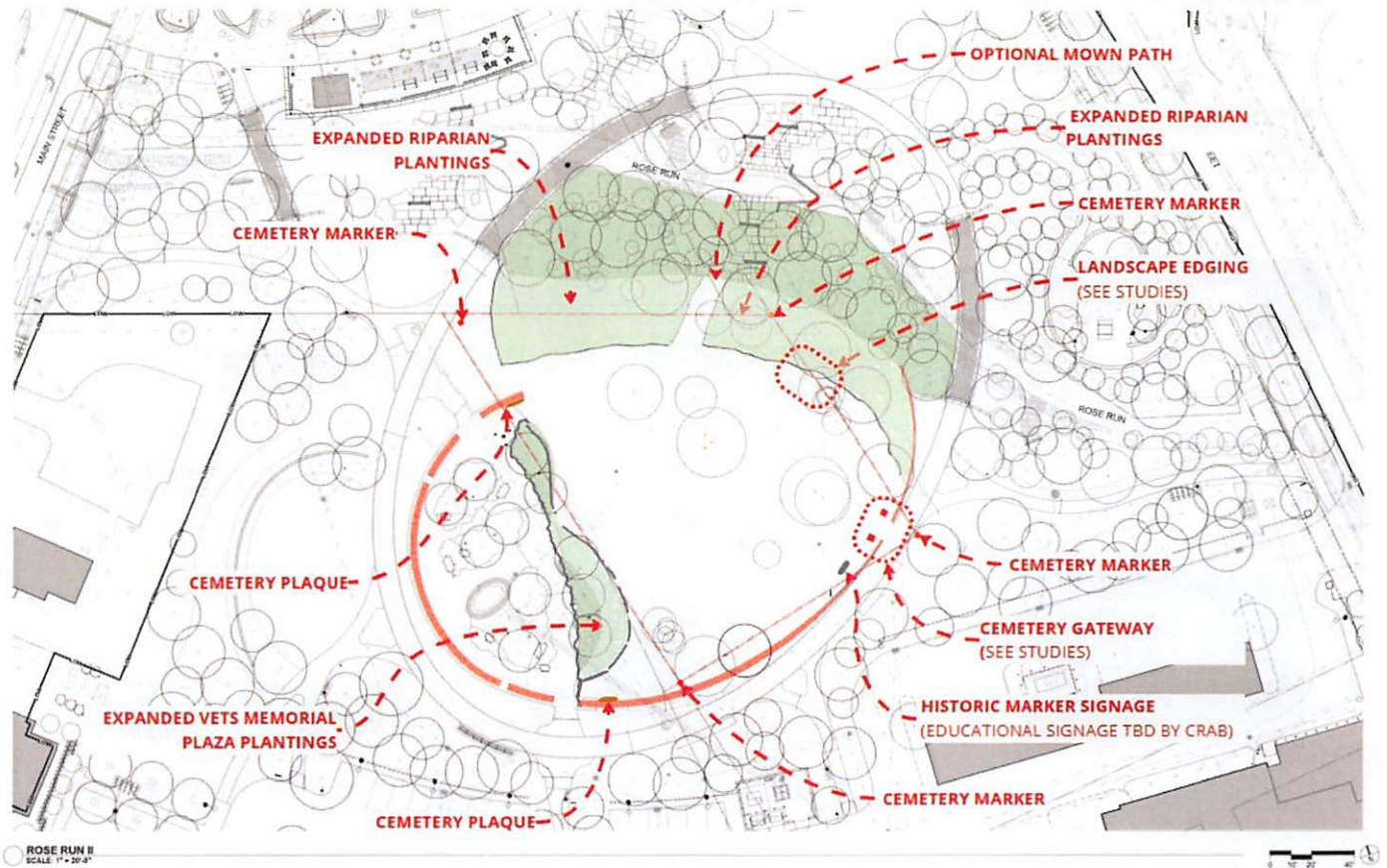

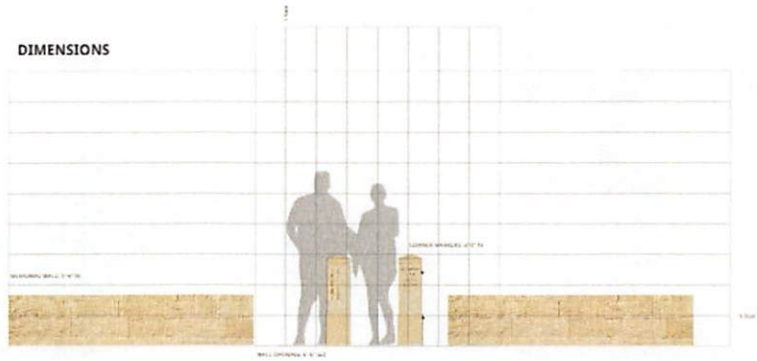

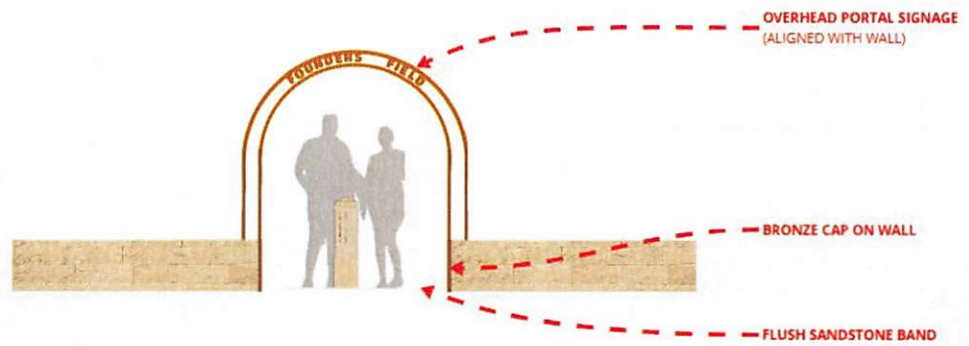

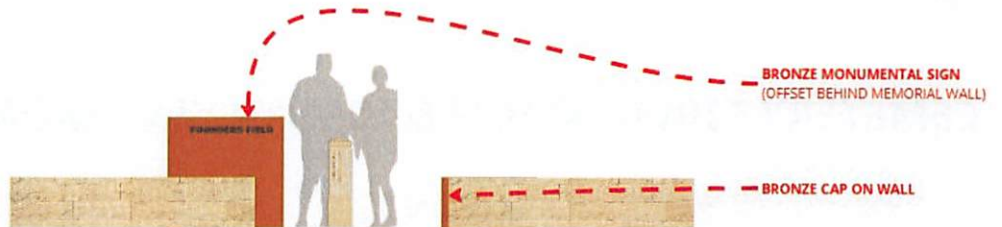

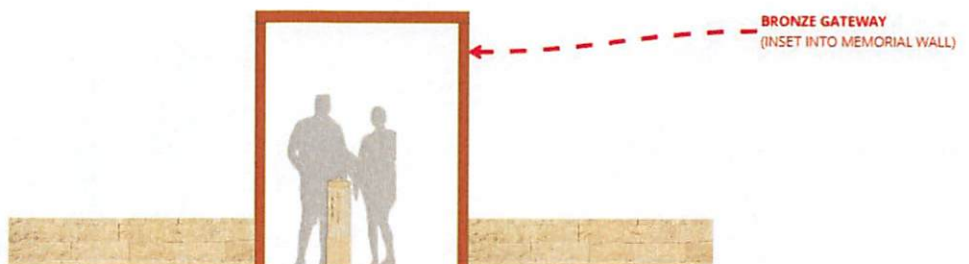
SCHEME 1: CEMETERY GATEWAY & FENCE



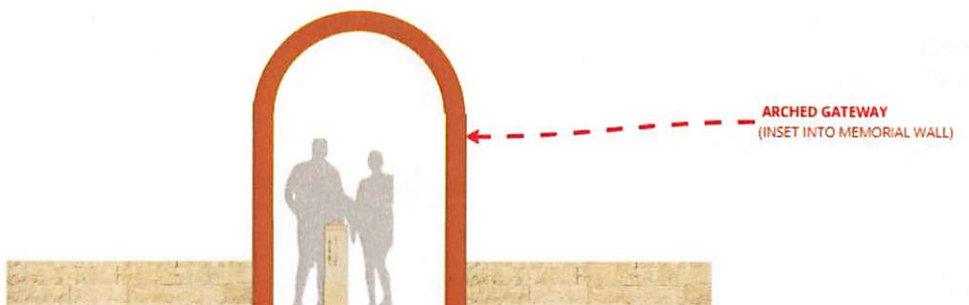
SCHEME 2: WALL BREAK

Markers to be re-made:

✓ **James H. Conkle**-d. 11 Apr 1861 6yrs-9m-18d (believed to be the son of Frances, but that has not been confirmed.

Notes: His marker was recorded on the 1979 list but has apparently been stolen or misplaced. Since he was a child, his new monument could be one of the typical children's markers (smaller with a picture of a lamb or other appropriate design). Please place it next to Frances Conkle, described below.

X **Harriet Smith** dau of _____ Smith

Notes: Should be remade in a stone tablet in a style similar to the original which cannot be restored. See page 129 of OVAI report. Perhaps the stone carver can obtain more information from the original monument.

X **William Yantis**- b.15 Nov 1791 d. 2 June 1872

Notes: William Yantis was the founder of New Albany. We won't add this to his monument, but we can put it on the Historic Marker that Council approved along with the restoration of the cemetery. It might be nice if this marker coordinated with Elizabeth Yantis' marker. Elizabeth was his wife. Her original marker is still standing in the cemetery. See page 124 of OVAI's report.

✓ **William Henry Yantis**- son of William and Elizabeth Yantis and husband of Amanda Yantis (first wife) and Rosa Belle Price (second wife). b. abt. 1816/1820 d. 24 Oct 1891.

Notes: This stone was missing but could be recreated to look similar to that of his wife, Amanda Yantis.

✓ **William H. Yantis**- son of William Henry Yantis and Amanda Yantis. b. 2 Jan 1854. d. 4 Jan 1854.

Notes: This monument was present in 1979 but is evidently missing now. It could be recreated in the style of stone that was typically used for infants and children (small).

Partial Repair / Replace monument still exists

✓ **Amanda M. Yantis**- Wife of William H. 26y-3m-29d (Full name: Amanda Alvina Closson Yantis) b. 1828 d. 4 Dec 1854.

Notes: There are 2 pieces of monuments which look similar and are pictured on p. 133 and 134 of the OVAI report. A suggestion was made by OVAI that the two might be part of the same monument. However, we later discovered these two pieces do not go together. The one piece says the deceased was 32 years old when she died. Amanda was 26 years old according to the information on the 1979 list. When remaking this monument it should look something like the picture on page 134 of the report. There is not enough information on the piece pictured on page 133 of the report so that monument should not be remade. The fragment should be preserved with the other fragments.

X **Elizabeth Phelps**- d. 12 Dec 1851 23 years

Notes: Monument should be remade to look as much as possible like the original. Although it could be reinserted in a slot, most of the information would be covered up by the slot. See page 135 of the OVAI report.

X **Isabella B. Robbins**- wife of James and dau of A. & J. Baum 16 Aug 1851.

Notes: See Isabella R. Robbins described in the section below. This one is a real mystery. The 1979 list has her dying on the same day as the other Isabella B. Robbins but in a different year. It also has her married to a James Robbins. I'd just remake this with the information listed above, even though there is probably some error by the person who recorded it (?). If a monument existed, it is now missing.

Mary Robbins- wife of J. Robbins died in 1863

Repair Notes: When remaking this monument, we should try to make it look similar to the original pictured on page 170 of the OVAI report. The 1979 list says her husband's name was Joe, but there does not seem to be evidence to support this so I would just duplicate the existing monument as much as possible.

Jane Ginn- wife of William Ginn d. 11 August 1858 83 years

Notes: We should duplicate this monument as close as possible to the original.

X **Lorenzo Ulry**- son of A. Ulry d. Mar 6, 1859 - *Sad resting*

Notes: This should be remade as close as possible to the original.

Rev. Joshua Montgomery- 20 April 1802-13 August 1870

Notes: A book was written about him and it stated he was buried in New Albany cemetery although he was active in the Westerville area. See Find-A-Grave.

Susannah Tanner Montgomery- 14 October 1810 – 4 Nov 1881

Notes: She is the wife of Joshua Montgomery.

Amos Kohn- 29 Sept 1796- Died in 1843

Notes: This grave was not identified until after the OVAI report was written and CRAB filed its report. However, Jesse Kohn was one of the original contributors of his land to the cemetery and his monument was one of the last standing monuments. Find-A-Grave indicates Amos is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds. Given the date of his death, it is likely he is buried in the New Albany Cemetery, as indicated.

Mary Ann "Molly" Olinger Kohn 1767-1853

Notes: This grave was not identified until after the OVAI report was written and CRAB filed its report. However, Jesse Kohn was one of the original contributors of his land to the cemetery and his monument was one of the last standing monuments. Find-A-Grave indicates Mary Ann is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds. Given the date of her death, it is likely she is buried in the New Albany Cemetery, as indicated.

Sarah Sager Kohn b. 1794 d. unknown –wife of Jesse Kohn

Notes: Notes: This grave was not identified until after the OVAI report was written and CRAB filed its report. However, Jesse Kohn (her husband) was one of the original contributors of his land to the cemetery and his monument was one of

the last standing monuments. Find-A-Grave indicates she is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds. Given the date of her birth, it is likely she is buried in the New Albany Cemetery rather than Maplewood.

George Kohn b. 11 May 1766 d. 1848

Notes: This grave was not identified until after the OVAI report was written and CRAB filed its report. However, Jesse Kohn was one of the original contributors of his land to the cemetery and his monument was one of the last standing monuments. Find-A-Grave indicates George Kohn is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds. Given the date of his death, it is likely he is buried in the New Albany Cemetery, as indicated.

William H. Huff b. 1867 d. 10 Mar 1871

Notes: This grave was not identified until after the OVAI report was written and CRAB filed its report. Find-A-Grave indicates he is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds and his date of death is too early for Maplewood cemetery. The Huff family has been in New Albany for a long time, so it is likely that William Huff is buried in the New Albany Cemetery.

These monuments are “close calls” and should be run by Mark Smith who can better decide if they should be repaired or need to be replaced:

Fixed **Frances Conkle**- wife of James, died 2 Jun 1863. 20 yrs-10m-13 d

Notes: Her monument was on the list compiled in 1979, but only part of her monument still exists. I don't believe it can be repaired, but I will leave that to Mark Smith or another expert. If it is remade, it should look something like marker #6, on page 123 of the Ohio Valley Archaeology (OVAI) report. If you look at Find-A-Grave, Memorial 44757349, there is a photo of the bottom half of the memorial with the top half leaning up against it.

~~X~~ **Isabella R. Robbins-** (see page 137 of the OVAI report)

Notes: Caution! There appear to have been two Isabella Robbins in the New Albany area and both were married to men named James Robbins. Here we are talking about the one who was the daughter of Noble Landon (not the Baum family) who died in July, 1854. According to Find-a-Grave, they were married in 1854 and she died in the same year. James Robbins then married Isabella's younger sister, Victoria Landon Robbins.

We should consult with Mark Smith and see if a piece of the monument can be restored on this one. It might not need to be remade if enough can be added to the bottom to make it fit into a slot without covering up the vital information. It would be nice if the restored (or remade) monument could be placed near the monuments for Noble and Lovisa Landon.

_____ **son of J. Landon** (see page 173 of the OVAI report).

Notes: We should check with Mark Smith to see if this monument can be repaired or should be replaced. I can't tell if the picture is just fuzzy or if the monument can be read enough to repair or replace it. If we can read the year of death, we could try to find it on Ancestry. If all else fails, just put it back together and put it back up.

Harman Ulry- son of S. & J.

Note: This one might just be cleaned and reset. Perhaps the stone Manufacturer could improve it so the "H" is more readable? This one is on Find A Grave

? **Dengman-** son of A & _____ - We don't have enough information to replace this one. If it cannot be repaired by Mark Smith we should just place it with the other fragments.

Find-A-Grave indicates Mary Ann is buried at New Albany Cemetery/Old Burying Grounds. Given the date of her death, it is likely she is buried in the New Albany Cemetery, as indicated.

Addendum

(Correction to pages 90, 103 and 104 of the report submitted by Ohio Valley Archaeology in 2016)

After publication of the report, "Rediscovering the New Albany Cemetery" by Ohio Valley Archaeology in 2016, additional information became available concerning William Yantis, co-founder of New Albany, his grave marker and that of his family members.

The Cemetery Restoration Advisory Board would like to thank Richard Yantis, a descendant of New Albany co-founder William Yantis, for clearing up the confusion surrounding the burial of William Yantis, his son William Henry Yantis, and his grandson, William H. Yantis.

William Yantis, the co-founder of New Albany, was born on 15 November 1791 and married Elizabeth Schissler Yantis. He was only married one time. He died 2 June 1872. Both the co-founder and his wife were buried in the New Albany Cemetery and are believed to remain there. Elizabeth Yantis' original marker still exists.

Their oldest child, William HENRY Yantis, married Amanda Alvina Closson (1828-1854). They had an infant son, William H. Yantis (1854-1854). Amanda and their son, William H. Yantis, were buried in the New Albany Cemetery shortly after their deaths in 1854 and are thought to remain there. Amanda's original stone still exists. The infant son's marker existed in 1979, but has since been lost or stolen.

After Amanda's death, William HENRY Yantis married Rosa Belle Price (second wife) in 1862. Both William HENRY Yantis and Rosa Belle Price Yantis were originally buried in the New Albany Cemetery but were reinterred to the Africa Cemetery some time later. According to family stories, their son, James Perry Yantis, was called to the New Albany Cemetery when the caskets of William HENRY Yantis (son of the co-founder) and his second wife, Rosa, were exposed after a particularly bad flood of the Rose Run Creek. James Perry Yantis used a horse-drawn wagon to transport his parents' caskets to the Africa cemetery for reinterment. William HENRY Yantis and his wife, Rosa, were reinterred a second time when Alum Creek Reservoir was built and the Africa cemetery was flooded to make the reservoir. They are now buried in the North State Road Cemetery behind the Presbyterian Church (now known as the Africa-East Orange Cemetery).

Richard Yantis also believes that the co-founder's father, Johannes Yandes/Yantis, may also be buried in the New Albany Cemetery, but as of this time, this cannot be verified.

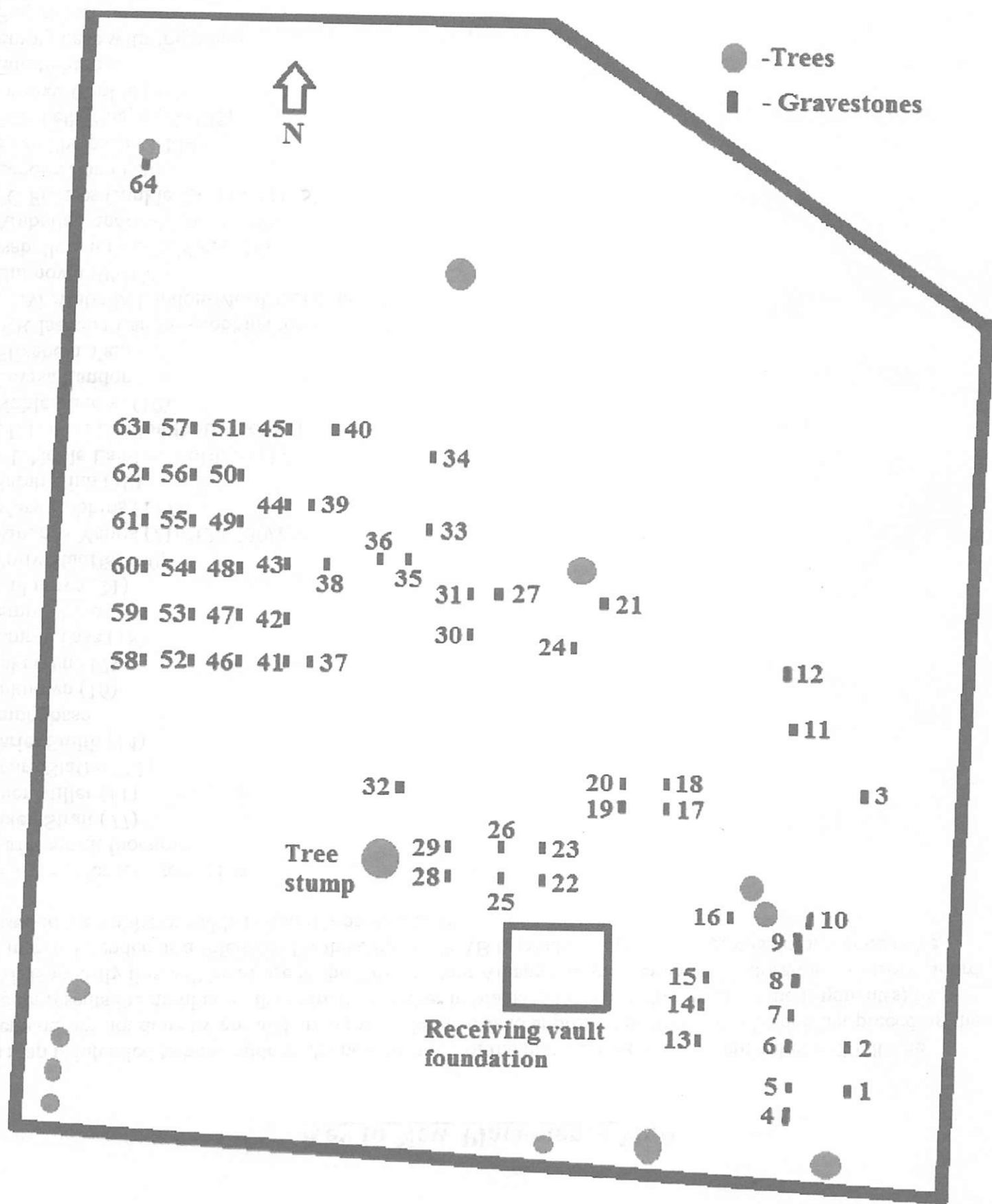
